

Laura Berge of Addie's Cup Coffee Shop has a yummy way to mark Fat Tuesday or Paczki Day! Laura is offering prepackaged authentic paczki (puhnch' kee) pastries from legendary Rudy's Bakery in Parma. Drawing on her Polish heritage, Laura has planned a traditional celebration at Addie' Cup. The Paczki Day tradition dates back to the Middle Ages as a way to use up sugar, lard and eggs before Lent begins. Whether you call it Mardi Gras, Fat Tuesday or Paczki Day, do stop by Addie's Cup early on February 13th before the paczki get sold out.

The Historical Society is moving forward as the Kish Family Gallery at the Southwick House Museum nears completion. The Society is grateful to longtime Village resident Dan Kish for his generous donation since additional display and storage space is sorely needed. Many Villagers recall that for decades the Gates Mills branch of the Cuyahoga County Library occupied two rooms on the main floor at the Southwick House. The brass plates denoting "Fiction" and "Reference" are vestiges of the building's past. The Society is planning an Open House in the spring to show off the new gallery.

As if the Historical Society's board members aren't busy enough with the Kish Family Gallery project, the **Walking Bridge Restoration** effort is ongoing. The current main thrust is researching grant money for the project. The iron crossing is a rare asymmetrical bridge over 100 years old, and may be the last example of its kind in Ohio. Since the Chagrin River runs below, the Ohio EPA will play a significant role and inform the Village how such a restoration should proceed.

Villager Patrick McLaughlin has written his first novel *Cheerful Obedience*. Having just finished reading it, I can agree with online reviewers in that it is an honest, gripping story of an infantry soldier in the 1960s Vietnam War. Based on his personal experiences, the story follows historical events and depicts the experiences of soldiers in that jungle war with the dangers, hardships and surprises. Main character Conor McKall soon learns to lead by example. Details on *Cheerful Obedience* are within.

The Nature Camp in the Village promises to be great fun for preschoolers, elementary age children and teens. Favorite cousins and best friends from beyond the Village may also enroll, but sign up soon as spots fill up quickly. # VILLAGE OF GATES MILLS



Hello Villagers,

I hope you had a wonderful holiday season with your family and friends. It is a special time to enjoy each other's company, retell stories from years past, and make New Year's resolutions for 2024. The Village Center was especially attractive with thousands of lights and decorations. And with calmer winds than last year, we were able to start the bonfire and gather around the tree, though in mud boots this year. Thanks to the village staff, organizations, donors and families who made the Christmas and Hanukkah season special for all of us in this beautiful Chagrin Valley.

We have been busy at village hall getting organized for 2024. We are excited to start evaluating the recommendations of the citizen-led Comprehensive Plan. Recall there were 21 major objectives and strategies, and over a hundred recommendations and actions. Council and I will work through them, using the plan as a guide for the village future. We'll likely undertake this in a workshop setting, and plan to open that to the public.

Several items are underway. The coffee shop has been open since June and is delivering an attractive menu and a warm place to gather and engage. We have finalized the specs to repair, resurface and repaint the tennis courts into two tennis courts and four pickleball courts. That work will be completed in the Spring. We had a great meeting today in forming a tree committee between the Village, the GM Land Conservancy and residents. The goal is to start with education to our villagers about tree health, create a tree plan, and execute the plan over the years with the ultimate goal of healthier trees, increased tree canopy and intentional use of levy proceeds.

In February, we plan to create and deliver a summary of 2023 and a view of priorities for 2024. Karen Schneider has left us a wonderful Village with a plan to guide our future, a strong financial picture, a dedicated staff, and most importantly, 2,000 engaged residents who want the best for Gates Mills. That's a pretty good situation to have inherited.

I look forward to collaborating with you and the various village organizations to move the Village forward into our third century.

### Gates Mills Police Department

#### Proud to Serve...Sworn to Protect

**From Your Police Department:** On behalf of the men and women of the Police Department, I would like to thank all those who contributed to the Village Employee Christmas Fund. I would also like to thank everyone who kept the Town Hall supplied with delicious holiday food items. Your thoughtful expressions of support for the Police Department are greatly appreciated. Below are some highlights from 2023:

-In 2023, we had a total of 7,273 calls for service. This number is up about 2% from 2022 when we had 7,083. These calls are primarily radioed from dispatch to our police officers. The most common call for service is burglar alarms. Generally speaking, the summer months are the busiest for us. More traffic is on the roadway, several community events in the village, and many residents are summer vacationing which leads to more house checks.

In 2023, approximately 30,000 vacation house checks were conducted by our patrol division. Further, our officers conducted another 15,000 checks of schools, churches, and businesses. We patrolled a total of 81,817 miles, of which about 15,000 is from our Tesla police car. We used approximately 6,130 gallons of fuel for our four Ford Explorers.

All of our police officers completed and are in compliance with the 24 hours of Continued Professional Training (CPT) that is required by the State of Ohio. This training includes legal updates, de-escalation, mental health training, etc. We will begin our mandated 24 hours for 2024 training shortly.

-Our GMPD Facebook page that launched has been very well received and now has over 2500 likes and followers! I encourage you to check it out and follow us for department updates.

-Our Mayfield Road Spped Camera Program launched in mid-August. From inception through the end of the year, approximately 10,000 speeding notices were issued. As a result of the program, speeds have dramatically decreased not only on Mayfield Road, but also on other roads in the village. The program is definitely changing driving behavior. A reminder that the program is in addition to traditional speed enforcement by our officers. In addition, our officers issued 794 handwritten citations to violators throughout the year. We are really working hard to keep our roadways as safe as possible. I would also like to report that we only had 40 traffic accidents in 2023, compared to 85 in 2022. Traffic issues are very important to our residents, and we work hard to be responsive to the needs of the community. I am absolutely thrilled to report that we had no traffic fatalities in 2023, thanks to the hardworking efforts of our police officers!

Now that the holidays are behind us and the reality of cold winter days are upon us, let's review some safety items.

Make sure your heating system has been inspected and serviced for safe operation and efficiency.

If using a wood-burning fireplace, the chimney should be cleaned and inspected regularly. Also, double-check BEFORE you start your fire that your flue damper is open. Use only seasoned firewood to help prevent the buildup of creosote. Make sure all combustibles are away from the fireplace hearth. Use a fireplace screen to control any sparks that may emit from the fireplace. Add just enough logs to control the fire size and create the ambiance that you like. Fireplace ashes, no matter how cold they seem, should be put in a metal container, and disposed of properly.

If thawing frozen pipes, use heat sources that do not have an open flame. If using portable electric heaters, they require large amounts of electricity and the extension cords used should be heavy duty. Thin gauge extension cords tend to overheat over an extended period.

Never leave automobiles, generators, or snow removal equipment idling in the garage to warm up. Move the equipment outdoors to prevent carbon monoxide from accumulating.

It is always prudent to make sure that your life-safety equipment in your home is working properly. Smoke detectors, carbon monoxide monitors, and fire extinguishers are your family's first line of defense.

#### Retiring Mayor Karen Schneider Found Guilty!

#### Retirement Party at The Community House Takes an Unexpected Twist!

Friday, January 19, 2024, Gates Mills It all started out like any other farewell party. Braving the frigid inclement weather, friends and neighbors came together in the Community House, 70+ strong, to enjoy delicious food prepared by the Community Club and to thank Karen Schneider for her 8 years as Mayor, 20 years as an engaged Village Council member and, before that, being an active volunteer with the PTA. Truly an unmatched record for one person to dedicate so many volunteer hours to the Village she loves so much!

As planned, a half hour into the festivities, Jim Stafford got up on stage to ask the audience, "Please find a nice comfortable seat since the Gates Mills Players have a very special treat for everyone." Jim then asked, "By a show of hands, how many of you truly enjoy a good Shakespeare play?" Many hands went up, and Jim then stated, "*Hamlet* has been widely accepted as Shakespeare's finest and possibly the longest play that he ever wrote. Literally, the play has 30,557 words in it—making it a very long play. Some theater groups have been known to take as long as 4 hours to perform this 5-act tragedy, others for about 2 hours. But the Gates Mills Players are very proud to dedicate our version of *Hamlet* to Karen which should only be a robust 3 hours."

Just as the audience started to realize that they would have to sit there unexpectedly for the next 3 hours, Jim was rudely interrupted by a Public Announcement read by Beth DeCapite who stated, "We interrupt this celebration to bring you BREAKING NEWS!! Our Worldwide reporter, Lindsey Steinbrink, is on the scene! Lindsey, what's the latest!"

Lindsey came up on stage, grabbed the mike from Jim, bumped him out of the way, and completely unbeknownst to Karen Schneider, Lindsey stated, "I'm here in Gates Mills where the much-loved Mayor Schneider, is being summoned to appear in court on charges of doing an extraordinary job as mayor." Lindsey went on to say, "Things are not looking good for the mayor since the very well-known grumpy Judge, who loves to wear a hangman's noose for a tie, Charley Marston, would be presiding over the trial!"

The curtains then opened, and instead of a stage set for *Hamlet*, much to the chagrin of Jim, a courtroom was ready for the trial! They were searching with their flashlights, looking all over for Mayor Schneider in the audience. At first, the Mayor's surprised look did not match her description, but eventually she was identified. And even though she did not put up any resistance, as with any potential felon like this, the protocol of handcuffing the suspect was carried out expeditiously! The two officers then escorted her to sit center stage next to her Defense Team of Janet Mulh, Jean Misch and Dorothy Slunski.

The Defense felt that they had a rock-solid case of proving that she was innocent of doing a very good job. One of the examples given was of Karen baking cookies for Villagers who were spending the holidays alone, proving that she was not in the office doing her mayoral duties.

A very good case, but not strong enough to overcome the Prosecution led by Sandra Turner! Sandra asked Villagers, Clark Langmack, Bob Reitman and Tim Richardson to give damning testimony of multiple examples of how the mayor brought volunteers together, kept things moving during Covid, sought outside funding for many improvements to the Village and even acquired a gift of a large boulder from Tim Richardson's son who said, "Sure take it!" The boulder was later used for The Daniel R. Collister Polo Field dedication. All of this proved, without a reasonable doubt, that Karen Schneider should be found GUILTY of being an extraordinary Mayor.

Judge Marston, who is not known for being objective, then called upon the audience/jury to raise their hands to vote for a guilty verdict. As he pounded his gavel, he proclaimed, "Karen Schneider is GUILTY as charged of being one of our very best and most extraordinary mayors in our Village history!"

Current Mayor, Steve Siemborski then read and gave Karen a Village Proclamation attesting to the same. Then Karen was presented with a stunning fireplace Fender gift courtesy of all of the Village organizations. This gift was made from two iron Gates Mills Broadhead street signs merged together by artisan Ken Roby of The Village Blacksmith. Thank you to Gates Mills Fire Department Captain, Mike Feig and Fire Chief, Tom Majeski for helping so much in preparing the Community House for our celebration needs, and to Rich Eichenberg, our outstanding photographer. Without everyone's involvement, this fun celebration could never have happened! Thank you to all.

# AUTHENTIC INTERURBAN TRACK AND TIES AT THE SOUTHWICK HOUSE MUSEUM

Where did the Cleveland and Eastern Railway run? The Historical Society has a new outdoor exhibit to show where the C&E ran through the Village courtesy of Dr. Dan Rager who donated original iron rails and spikes. To draw attention to the tracks, over the holidays Jim Stafford and Marcia Anselmo put up a cheerful Christmas train decoration.

From 1899 to 1925, the C&E Maple Leaf Route carried passengers from Cleveland to Gates Mills and beyond through Chesterland's Scotland Station, then on to either Chardon or Middlefield, Ohio.


The old iron Walking Bridge shows where the route crossed the Chagrin River. Heading northeast it crossed over River Road, through the dispatcher's office, then behind Sara's rear parking area and onward in a diagonal line





towards Old Cord Lane before heading to Scotland Corners Station. Going in the opposite direction towards Cleveland, the tracks went along Main Street veering south making a large switchback turn at the back of Daniel Collister Polo Field and then upward along Berkshire Road to wind up on the property now occupied by St. Francis Church to go into Cleveland.

Thank you to Dr. Rager and Bill Ward who installed the historic display as a gift to the Historical Society. Three of Dr. Rager's books on the electric Interurban railways (shown below) are available through the Historical Society's gift shop and online at Amazon.com. 

This is a work of fiction. Yet, anyone who served in Vietnam will recognize the authenticity of the book. If you paid your dues as an infantry grunt you may feel that you are looking into a mirror. Whether you served or not, know someone that did, are curious about the Vietnam War, or you just want to read a book that strives to story-tell then read Cheerful Obedience.

While the book's characters are fictional, some of the battles that are described took place on the dates set forth. 





# CHAGRIN HUNTER JUMPER CLASSIC ANNOUNCES 2024 DATE



The popular Chagrin Hunter Jumper Classic will return to Northeast Ohio in 2024. Hosted at Chagrin Valley Farms in Bainbridge, the event will run in July with the opening unrated competition July 5-7, Riders with Disabilities competition on July 8, and the expanded rated week July 10-14, 2024. The nationally A-rated week will host a full roster of divisions including a \$9,999 Jumper Classic and the \$5,000 USHJA National Hunter Derby.

The nonprofit 501c3 Chagrin Hunter Jumper Classic is run by the volunteer board whose mission is to host a first-class equestrian event, support local charities and educate the public about equestrian sports. Due to its growing attendance and improved financial stability after relocating to Chagrin Valley Farms, the horse show saw a profit in 2023 for the first time in several years. At its December 18 board meeting, donations from the horse show were announced and benefited area nonprofits including Fieldstone Farm Therapeutic Riding Center, Rainbow Babies and Children's Hospital, Cleveland Metroparks Polo Field Fund, Ronald McDonald House, Rescue Village, Cleveland APL, PetFix Northeast Ohio, Angels Haven Horse Rescue, In Step With Horses, Tri-State Region Pony Club, and Ohio Professional Horseman's Assn. (OPHA) Scholarship Fund.

The 2024 volunteer Board will be co-chaired by Rebecca Brayton McNish of Newbury and returning co-chair Karen

Schneider of Gates Mills. Schneider, who has served the board since 1974, chaired it from 1996 to 2015, and is the retired Mayor of Gates Mills.

#### **Background**

The Chagrin Hunter Jumper Classic is recognized by the United States Equestrian Federation as a Heritage Competition, having originally launched at the Cleveland Metroparks Polo Field in 1948 under the organization of the Chagrin Trails and Riding Club. After management was assumed by the Chagrin Valley PHA, the horse show became internationally renowned for hosting and organizing the first show jumping grand prix in North America, the Cleveland Grand Prix, in 1965.

Following the pandemic shut down, diminished sponsorship and rising costs led to the event settling into its new home at <u>Chagrin Valley Farms</u> in 2021. Chagrin Valley Farms has made significant improvements to its facility to create a top equestrian venue and accommodate the national competition, including state-of-the-art footing, which has become a standard at top shows across the country. The Classic also continues a 24-year tradition of hosting the Riders with Disabilities Horse Show in partnership with <u>Fieldstone Farm Therapeutic Riding Center</u>.
