

Dear Villagers,

Earth Day was founded by United States Senator Gaylord Nelson from Wisconsin as a teach-in on the environment. Senator Nelson felt we only have one earth so we need to take care of her. On that first Earth Day on April 22, 1970, an estimated 20 million people nationwide participated in activities. It was a truly astonishing grassroots explosion, eventually leading to national legislation such as the Clean Air Act and the Clean Water Act. Great strides in environmentalism have been made, but there is always more that can be done—globally, nationally and locally.

On the local level, small deeds have impact. **The Green Fox** has made a page on recycling from information found on Rumpke.com and CuyahogaRecycles.org. Both sites are quite informative. Plastic is today's scourge. We all need to try harder to curb our reliance on plastic and establish good recycling habits. It is good for our health, the health of our fellow creatures and the welfare of our planet.

The **Annual Roadside Clean-up**, organized by The Garden Club, addresses the trash that accumulates over the winter in the Village. The effort is planned for Earth Day weekend, and all Villagers are welcome to join in. Much of that litter is recyclable cans and bottles. Participation in the clean-up helps maintain the beauty of the Village and demonstrates appreciation for the environment.

On January 4, 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day called "**Arbor Day**" be set aside for the planting of trees. Prizes were offered to counties and individuals for properly planting the largest number of trees on that day. It was estimated that more than one million trees were planted in Nebraska on the first Arbor Day. Morton knew that trees control erosion, form windbreaks and offer shade from the scorching summer sun. And they still do! Villagers can celebrate Arbor Day, the last Friday in April, by choosing a tree (or trees) at our very own **Chagrin Valley Nurseries** on River Road. The nursery sells to individuals as well as landscapers. Take the nursery drive down, make the wide bend to the right and the office is in the long white building. See: cvnursery.com, call (440) 423-3363 or look for Chagrin Valley Nursery on Facebook. As the sign proclaims: "WE GIVE THE EARTH WITH EVERY PLANT."

Earth Day Recycling Tips from The Green Fox



Acceptable Items for Recycling: (See Rumke.com)

- Glass Bottles & Jars (all colors)
- Metal Cans: Aluminum cans, steel cans and lids, empty aerosol cans with the lids and tips removed
- Plastic Bottles (empty, crush, **reattach lid**): Bottles and jugs that have a small mouth and wider base, such as milk jugs, soda bottles, laundry detergent bottles, water bottles, shampoo bottles
- Paper: newspaper, magazines, cardboard, mixed office paper and envelopes, paperboard (cereal boxes), pizza boxes free of food debris and grease, telephone books and catalogs
- Cartons: food and beverage cartons, such as milk, juice, soup, wine, broth and other cartons.

Recycling Tips

- Mix all items together – no separation required
- Empty all bottles, jugs and cans; no need to remove labels
- For plastic bottles, **empty, crush and reattach lids**
- For cartons, remove plastic caps and straws
- NEVER place medical sharps or needles in the recycling
- **Plastic outer bulk packaging can be recycled at Giant Eagle bins along with grocery store bags.**

NOTE: For Gates Mills residents: the large blue plastic bags used for recycling are recycled by Rumke.

NOT for Recycling

No plastic grocery & store bags, cassette tapes, hangers, metal chains, garden hoses, batteries, needles, syringes, electronics, polystyrene foam, buckets, butter tubs, car parts, yard waste, light bulbs, drinking glasses, ceramics, pots, pans, and scrap metal.

Rumke experienced more than a dozen fires at its Cincinnati and Columbus recycling facilities in 2017.

- We also continue to see numerous truck fires across the company. The culprit: batteries.
- Placing batteries – **specifically lithium ion batteries** – in your recycling and trash containers causes a dangerous situation.
- When batteries break, they spark fires, putting employees and the motoring public unnecessarily at risk.
- Don't place batteries in your trash or recycling containers.
- Please learn how to properly dispose of unwanted batteries through your solid waste district.

Batteries Plus Bulbs on Mayfield Road, Mayfield Heights recycles:

- Lead acid (Pb) Batteries - Cars, Trucks and Emergency Lighting
- Nickel Cadmium (NiCd) Batteries - Cordless phones, Tools and Two Way Radios
- Nickel Metal Hydride (NiMH) Batteries - Camcorders, Cameras and Bar Code Scanners
- Lithium Ion (Li Ion) & Lithium Polymer (Li Poly) - Cell phones and Laptops

The calendar says it's spring, but the jury is still out. April brings our clean-up days. Please volunteer to help us maintain the beauty of our Village. The Garden Club organizes the clean-up by streets, so please check their Pink Sheet page to see where you can help.

Along with the Village's roadside clean-up, many of you will be planning your own spring cleanings. Please make sure to check our Ordinances online to comply with painting, fences and sign regulations, especially if you live in our Historic District. Maintenance regulations for these items are now in our Village code. We do allow tree cutting; however, you will need a permit issued by our Building Department. If you have maintenance or permit questions, please call Town Hall, (440) 423-4405.

We are calling residents to pick-up building plans for your address Monday through Friday from 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. by May 1st. These architectural plans were in our storage area, and we no longer need to keep plans past 5 years. Some are very old while others are not. It is very interesting to see our old history.

Please remember to download the free "Your 911" app onto your phones. This replaces the current CodeRed system. The "Your 911" app allows you to receive emergency notifications along with the ability to more efficiently dial 911 in an emergency situation.

The Village's annual Easter Egg Hunt was held on Saturday, March 31st. A big thank you goes out to Jocelyn Brogley, Dr. Doug Webb, and our Service and Administration Departments who help the Easter Bunny prepare for the big day!

Our Forty-seventh Annual Art Show begins on Sunday, April 15th, and goes through Sunday, April 29th. It is a great show! The show has afternoon and evening hours to make it easy for everyone to attend. Many Villagers are involved in the organization and running of the show, and their efforts are appreciated.




Patrons who purchase art at the Preview Party are invited to meet the artists at their party the following evening.



NEWS FROM THE CHIEF!

SPRING IS HERE!

Please be cautious of the hazards that may come with outdoor clean-up activities. In Gates Mills we have had a number of fires that were caused by leaves, debris and other yard waste that had accumulated around the house, garage and storage sheds. To keep your home safe from these types of fires, remove the buildup of these materials. Please remember that open burning of leaves, tree branches, yard waste, and lumber/construction material is not permitted and is a violation of Ohio EPA regulations. Sparks and embers can and do start other fires.

Another SAFETY concern is people that may come too close to the edge of the numerous ravines and cliffs in Gates Mills while doing yard work or just enjoying the outdoors. Over the years a number of people in Gates Mills (both residents and visitors) have fallen into deep ravines and were rescued by members of our Safety Forces and our Regional Technical Rescue Team. Enjoy the natural beauty of our village, but be aware of your surroundings and always carry a cell phone to use in the event of an emergency. *Speaking of cell phones, have you downloaded the Your 911 app yet? Our "old" mass notification system (Code Red) will be replaced soon! Contact Village Hall if you need help downloading the app.*

Safety Tips:

- Never store yard waste or compost materials near your home, garage, or any structure. These items can start a fire.
- Always store fuel for lawn and garden equipment in approved containers with lids.
- Never store gas grills or spare propane cylinders indoors.
- If you have a gas grill, make sure all connections are tight and check the condition of the hose(s) for cracks or damaged areas.
- Turn off propane cylinders after every use.

By the time you read this column, spring will have finally arrived! It was a pretty tough winter especially the cold temperatures we experienced in February. Hopefully you will have a great spring as we look forward to the summer months and events that are on the horizon!

On Saturday, April 28, 2017, from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm at the Gates Mills Town Hall, Detective Day will be on site to accept your old/unwanted medications for the National Prescription Drug Take-Back program. *Please remember, we are unable to accept liquids or needles.*

In addition to participating in the Drug Take-Back Program, a reminder that The Village of Gates Mills has partnered with the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Office to offer our residents the opportunity to drop off unused, old or expired prescription drugs 24 hours per day, 7 days a week. Drug Drop Boxes provide a safe, environmentally friendly way for our residents to dispose of these prescription drugs. Hanging on to unused or expired medications poses health risks for everyone in your home. The Drug Drop Box is located under the overhang at the side Village Hall door, across from the Community House, for your convenience, at all times of the day or night.

This year's Safety Town will be held from July 23rd – July 27th at the Gilmour Academy Ice Arena. Morning and afternoon sessions will be scheduled at a cost of \$25.00. The fee will be used to assist Gilmour Academy in defraying the cost to use their facility. This is the 5th consecutive year we have partnered with Gilmour Academy to hold Safety Town, and the program has been extremely popular and successful. Registration can only be done online at www.gilmour.org/summercamp beginning Tuesday, May 1st.

We have had a recent surge of residents signing up for our new Your 911 safety app. We now have over 300 residents registered. Be sure to sign up so you will continue to receive mass notifications as we will be phasing out our current Code Red system in a few months. If you have questions regarding the new system, please call Dorothy or Jean at the town hall during business hours for information or assistance in registering. 



Thank you, Horace Fletcher!



An avid reader, Fletcher became versed in many areas, particularly engineering. Fletcher was a self-taught artist who demonstrated his creative talents in many ways. One time he fashioned a perfect pair of false teeth from a hambone. Another time, Fletcher created his own automobile license plate, but he used the wrong number sequence. The police pulled Fletcher over and brought him before a judge. Village lore has it that Fletcher asked local residents Mr. Ernst and Mr. Jones to represent him, and Fletcher only received a warning.

Fletcher was a freethinker and a hippie ahead of his time. He lived with his mother in a forbidding house that had neither lights nor water and was guarded by watchdogs and ringed with fences. Ah, the good old days!

The beautiful black wrought iron street signs in the Village are the artistry of the late Horace Fletcher. Fletcher was a handyman in the Village who was commissioned by the Village Council in the 1940's to beautify the town.

The black ironwork is a frame for the carved white nameplate bearing the street's name in brush script. A scene sits atop the nameplate. Each scene is different, yet a hunting and horse theme unites them all. One entrance sign to the Village is a polo scene proclaiming the Village was founded in 1826. Another is a horse and jumper clearing a fence, while another one is a horse and buggy declaring the Village is a Bird Sanctuary. Hunters and hunting dogs are a motif as are game birds and barns.

Library Lagniappe: Passports and Photos

The Gates Mills Branch of the Cuyahoga County Library provides many "extra" services. Did you know that the library is a Passport Acceptance Agency?

Last year, staff at the library processed 368 passport applications and took 391 passport photos. The cost for a passport photo at the library is \$10 plus tax, which compares favorably to the cost at FedEx or CVS. It is best to have your passport photo taken at the library because sometimes photos taken offsite do not meet passport standards and must be retaken.


Adults applying for a first time passport and children under the age of 15 applying for a first time passport or a renewal are required to have their application processed at a U.S. Passport Office or a Passport Acceptance Agency. Adults must provide an original or certified copy of their birth certificate and their driver's license. For children under the age of 15, in addition to providing their birth certificate, both parents listed on the birth certificate must be present during the application process. Payment for first time passports and children's renewal passports is made at the time of the application and the library mails in the application.

Forms for and help with the passport renewal process are also available at the library.







A PAGE TO SHARE NEWS ABOUT FRIENDS AND NEIGHBORS WHO LIVE IN THE VILLAGE OR WHO HAVE MOVED AWAY.

JOHN J. KRALIK M.D. was born 11th February 1924, in Cleveland, Ohio. He started school at Our Lady of Peace in Shaker Heights. He was a year younger than his classmates at Cathedral Latin High School, but “Johnny,” as they called him, stood out as a brilliant student, and became the Valedictorian and Vice-President of the Class of 1941. As a concert violinist, he was the concertmaster of the Cathedral Latin Orchestra, and won numerous National and Ohio State Violin Championships.

Dr. Kralik won a scholarship to John Carroll University, but transferred to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston, MA to study marine architecture. His plans to be an engineer were interrupted by the Second World War. On 1st December 1942, he enlisted in the Army as a private. He often told the story of how the officer at morning line-up asked whether anyone would like to be a doctor. Although the thought had never crossed his mind, he stepped forward to answer yes. In his book, *Open Sesame*, Dr. Kralik described how he passed the admissions test, which had only one question: “How many siblings do you have?” He had two, his sister, Elizabeth, and his brother, Richard, both of whom he loved dearly, and who he now joins in heaven.

The Army assigned Private Kralik to Temple University, where he quickly completed undergraduate school. He was then assigned to the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine. In 1946, with the end of World War II, Dr. Kralik was honorably discharged from the Army, but he had found his passion for surgery, and decided to complete medical school. He remembered, and strove to meet the ideals of his surgical mentor, Dr. Isadore Ravdin, who told students: “You have now joined a profession which has been actuated for centuries by the desire to relieve suffering humanity. The profession should include only men and women who are willing to give the best they have unselfishly.”

After graduating from Pennsylvania in 1949, Dr. Kralik began his residency at University Hospital at Case Western University in Cleveland. By 1951, he was the Chief Resident, specializing in cardiac surgery. That year he met Rita Hennessey, a striking, independent-minded nurse from Niagara Falls, New York who was working in obstetrics and pediatrics at McDonald House. John and Rita first talked as they were walking home from Mass at the Newman Club. Smitten immediately, John soon asked Rita to see George Szell conduct the Cleveland Orchestra at the Severance Center. They were married on 27th December 1952.

In 1953, Dr. and Mrs. Kralik were called back to the Army as part of the Korean War effort. He was assigned to Brooke Army Hospital in San Antonio, Texas where he had the opportunity to work with the world’s most advanced heart surgeons. John and Rita’s first child, Rita Marie was born in San Antonio.

During his 15-month tour of duty at Brooke, Dr. Kralik travelled the country, often at his own expense, to observe advanced techniques in cardiac surgery, including the first heart-lung machines that made open-heart surgery possible. He established a new Cardiovascular Surgical Service at Brooke, where he built his own heart-lung machine, and performed numerous major heart operations and cardiac catheterizations. He was again honorably discharged in 1954, having reached the rank of first lieutenant of the Medical Corp.

After his war-time service, John and Rita returned to Cleveland, where he established the Cardiac Surgery department at Marymount Hospital. He again built his own heart-lung machine and developed and taught to others his advanced technique. His attention to detail, high level of expertise, dedicated blood bank, and intense multi-day follow up with

his patients resulted in an unusually high rate of success, and happy patients telling their stories: the Cleveland papers of the 50's and 60's were full of articles about how his patients were saved by his rare and remarkable surgeries. The Cleveland Press even ran a comic strip in which he was featured as "Dr. Kralik."

In 1965, Dr. Kralik became Chief Resident of Wilmington Hospital in Wilmington Delaware. Moving to Delaware was a logistical feat because by 1965, John and Rita had eight more children: two girls, Elizabeth and Kristin, and six boys, John, Raphael, Michael, Gabriel, Joseph and James. Michael is now a heart surgeon in Phoenix, Arizona.



Returning to Marymount Hospital in Cleveland in 1966, Dr. Kralik continued to specialize in cardiac and thoracic surgery. He was a pioneer in the installation of pacemakers, and resuscitation technique. He also branched out into numerous additional areas of general surgery. Again, his skill and mortality rate stood out.

Dr. Kralik continued to operate and practice medicine until age 80, when he was felled by a heart attack on his way home from Geauga Hospital in rural Ohio. His life was saved by a triple bypass performed by Dr. Robert Stewart, who dared to take on this difficult case. Dr. Kralik remained in critical care for more than a month, but had a strong will to live and awoke to fourteen more years of life.

Throughout his life, Dr. Kralik had a natural aptitude for teaching. He taught his surgeries and techniques to many younger physicians, including recent immigrants whose immigration and naturalization he supported. His love of learning and teaching did not stop with medicine. He loved to teach almost any subject, including the abacus, accounting and finance, astronomy, computers, card games, chess and backgammon, and of course, his beloved violin.

In his later years Dr. Kralik spent much of his time on Amelia Island, Florida. He loved to walk along the tranquil beach with his wife Rita, and watch the sunsets and moonrises. He returned to his treasured violin, and would often play Moon River while looking out at the long river of moonlight stretching into the Atlantic Ocean. At 93, Dr. Kralik became an author. His book, Open Sesame, available at Amazon.com, explains the magic of the compound-interest equation, and the financial wonders that it can unlock.

When Dr. Kralik passed away at the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Florida on 28th February 2018, he was with his wife Rita, and his sons Michael and James. Dr. and Mrs. Kralik have been married for 65 years. Many of their anniversaries had been marked by earrings bought at Tiffany's, after breakfast. He was being cared for by his daughter Elizabeth, a nurse practitioner, who has given the last four years of her life to caring for her parents.

Dr. Kralik's powerful intellect remained with him to the end: on occasion the nurses could not distinguish which orders were his, and which were from the attending physicians. His own life was the longest of any known Kralik family member, but his legacy is in the hundreds of thousands of patients whose lives were extended by his surgeries, care, and teachings. His patients were of all ages, from the many precious children whose congenital heart defects he repaired, to the many elderly whose hearts remained beating because he replaced their coronary arteries or gave their hearts new rhythms with pacemakers installed at all hours of the day and night.

A devout Roman Catholic throughout his life, Dr. Kralik attended Mass and prayed the rosary almost daily. His last stop before the operating room was always the hospital chapel. He often operated on priests and nuns without charge and would pay for their hospital stay, never saying a word. He was a Member of the Knights of Columbus and a follower of the Christophers, whose motto was "It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness." He taught each of his children to memorize the 91st Psalm and to recite it in moments of fear or pain. On 28th February 2018, he attained the ultimate promise God makes to David at the end of the Psalm:

I will deliver him and glorify him.
With length of days, I will gratify him,
and show him my salvation.

Dr. Kralik is survived by his wife Rita, by all nine of his children, by grandchildren John, Joshua, Katie, Luke, Meagan, Molly, Peter, Ethan, Ryan, Chun-Yin, Yuan Mei, Christopher, Sean, Jiayin and Liam, as well by his great-grandchildren Hayden, Grayson, Orion, Zemra, Zarina, Tessa and Blake.

Ohio Legislative Service Commission Fellowship Gives Recent Graduates Unique Insight into State Government



Graduation is fast approaching, which means the job market will soon be flooded with well-educated new professionals looking to start careers. What recent graduates will find is a competitive field that values intelligence and experience. Many who easily clear the first hurdle, however, find themselves stumped by the second. Graduates today are expected not only to have spent their time in college becoming educated individuals, but they are expected to accrue workplace experience that will give them the edge when applying for jobs.

Mindful of the challenges posed by these competing interests, however, the Ohio Legislative Service Commission (LSC) offers a fellowship program for recent graduates interested in beginning careers in state government. As an entry program, it provides an opportunity for those with less experience to learn, first-hand, important and marketable skills. The LSC Fellowship program, which has been in place for more than fifty years, sponsors approximately 24 paid fellowship positions throughout state government. The skills acquired through the fellowship prepare them for careers in any field.

The fellowship is open to everyone, regardless of political affiliation or college major. Program participants will be placed in one of three areas: the majority or minority caucuses of the Ohio House or the Ohio Senate; as a member of the LSC research and fiscal staff; or as a telecommunications assistant with Ohio Government Television (OGT). Twenty LSC fellows are traditionally assigned to work for one of the four legislative caucuses where they assist legislators in areas such as speech writing, constituent services and other legislative work. The remaining fellows are split between the LSC research staff and OGT positions.

Before being placed into offices, fellows are given an intensive two-week training. They learn all the basics of state government, how to manage an office, handle constituent cases, research legislation, and much more. In addition to the skills acquired in the fellowship, participants are able to explore all areas of state government through a number of tours they will take with their colleagues. These tours provide an opportunity to learn about the functions of our state agencies in fun, interactive ways. Lastly, those participating in the fellowship will join a network extending far around the state of Ohio. They will meet former fellows who are now staffers, lobbyists, legislators, congressmen, and even Governor!

The LSC Fellowship Program lasts for thirteen months, beginning at the beginning of December and ending December 31 of the following year. Telecommunications candidates must submit their applications by April 30. It is important to note that an applicant must obtain a bachelor's degree before the start date of the next class in order to qualify.
